Day two gave students the opportunity to team up and work together to solve real world problems that impact the Mandurah Community through innovative creativity and technology. Halls Head College was represented by Big Picture teams.

Year 12 students Eva and Brydee with support from Year 9 student Logan won the Girls in Tech Award with \$250 prize money. Logan also won the Advocacy Award supporting the Girls in Tech.







Year 8 students Max, Ben and Jun won rST place with a design for a submarine that will clean microplastics from the ocean. These students also have now been chosen to represent GoSH at the Young Entrepreneur Expo at the West Tech Festival in December. This will allow them to showcase their design ideas and processes. In the near future they will have the opportunity to join some of the other hackathon participants in sharing their ideas with Mandurah Mayor Rhys Williams and City of Mandurah councillors.


